We are entering the gateway to summer as we begin May. And with us moving into summer, I want you to think about what's next for Plymouth. I have found the book, <u>Being Church in a Liminal Time: Remembering, Letting Go, Resurrecting</u> (Jeffrey Jones and David Frederickson, 2023), to be particularly helpful. In many discussions I've had with you, we have agreed that congregation life has fundamentally changed since Covid-19.

This book takes on that subject to explore both the challenges and opportunities that this church is facing in this period of transition (from what we've been and done in the past) and uncertainty (to what we will need to be and need to be doing in the near future). The writers suggest that the traditional models for doing church no longer will be adequate to engage the complexities of the modern world. The term they use, "liminal time", refers to a period of transition where old structures are breaking down and new ones are emerging but are not in full view yet. Jones and Frederickson point to the changes in worship attendance, declining interest in institutional religion and what it means to do ministry in a post-Christian culture. In the past it was said, "If you build it (a sanctuary, hire a youth minister, etc.), they will come." Today, what we find is "they don't come".

So rather than cling to outdated structures or resorting to superficial methods of evangelism, they advocate for a willingness to embrace change. Change has never been easy for Presbyterians. "How many Presbyterians does it take to change a light bulb? Change!? Well, my grandmother donated that light bulb and that light fixture! Don't you dare touch it!"

We must embrace change. The state of change is the constant here!

Jones and Frederickson advise to experiment with new forms of worship (like under a tent in the park with dance and art) and community engagement (with a booth at the community fair offering training classes in computing skills). And by so doing, this and more, a congregation like ours could cultivate an authentic witness that resonates with the deepest needs and aspirations of St Helenese people today. I've had to shorten much of what these authors say. And, yet... we have the opportunity before us for renewal and rediscovery of what it truly means to be the body of Christ in the world today. We can discern a way forward in this time of change. Our way forward will include remembering, letting go, and resurrecting.

I think you'll enjoy this story for the rich music and the encouraging message.

PENTECOST OFFERING

Just a few short Sundays from now, we will be celebrating Pentecost (May 19), which means that we will be gathering our Pentecost offering. This offering, as it says on the PCUSA website, unites us in a "churchwide effort to support young people and inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world."

These young people, who are the church today and the church to come, as well as at-risk children benefit in many ways from our gifts. Since 1980, Youth Triennium has been held, using funds from the Pentecost offering. Of the funds that we gather, up to 40% can stay in the local congregation to support programs that benefit young people. The other 60% supports efforts of the Presbyterian Mission Agency for youth and at-risk children. We hope you will give to this offering as you can. Many thanks!

Change for Change

Our quarters for this quarter (as well as our nickels and dimes and pennies!) will be given to an organization called Fostering Love Kits of Columbia County. You can find out much more information about them on their website, but this will give you a start.

Often when children are moved into foster care, it seems to the child that everything is happening at a very fast pace. The child, of course, has little to say about any of it, including what toys or clothing might go with him or her. Things are stuffed rapidly into a bag and the child is off with people he or she likely does not know. In an effort to make this a bit more child-friendly, kits are put together with age-appropriate items and given to the child. Our coins will be used to help in purchasing some of these things. If you check their website

(put fosteringlovekitsofcolumbia county in your search engine), you will see items that go into these kits. And we are in the process of arranging for a speaker to come on a Sunday to tell us more about this.
