Dear Friends,

We need a few small failures, small intelligent failures. You and I both know that success or failure comes from trying something new, something entirely different and even climbing out on a limb we've never been on before. It involves taking a risk. Taking risks involve risking failure. What's the benefit? Well, how about these for example:

- 10,000 failures led to the discovery of the electric light bulb.
- Blind dates lead to success: finding the right one.
- Dr. Spencer Silver failed to develop a bigger, stronger, tougher adhesive for 3M Company.
 He instead discovered microspheres that retained their stickiness and yet a removable characteristic that became the Post-It Note.
- Navel engineer Richard James was working on developing sensitive springs to keep fragile
 equipment steady on ships. When he knocked one of his new springs from a shelf, it did not just
 hit the floor, instead it did that famous Slinky walk down. Slinky was born for Christmas, 1945.
- The Washburn Crosby Company was busy in 1922 preparing a gruel mixture when a clumsy dietician spilled some on a hot stove, which led to the gruel drops sizzling and crackling into flakes. When tasted, this accident led to the breakfast cereal named as the Breakfast of Champions: Wheaties!

The examples could go on and on (plastic bottles and jugs, saccharine as a sugar substitute, penicillin or the pacemaker). Failures of one kind have led to the invention of another. So I say, we need a few small intelligent failures.

From the excellent book, <u>Right Kind of Wrong: The Science of Failing Well</u>, Amy Edmondson points out that "we tend to avoid failure at all costs...Our smarter missteps are worthwhile because they can force us to take a different path that points us toward personal and professional success." And elsewhere she says, "An intelligent failure is an undesired result in new territory." These are the days for trying and failing. Learning from that failure and trying again. We have the words of Thomas Edison to guide us, "I have not failed. I have found 10,000 ways that won't work."

Here are some ways we could take intelligent risks:

- 1. Host a catered dinner for our neighbors as Plymouth's "get-to-know-you" dinners.
- 2. Host outdoor movie and popcorn for __ (number) of nights of summer 2025.
- 3. Set a goal for 2025 budget and fully support it. Let's risk a few small, intelligent failures together!

They are ready for volunteers to spend some time doing all kinds of projects. Perhaps we can start to talk about what we might be able to do to help. PEACE AND GLOBAL WITNESS OFFERING

On Sunday, October 1, we will again gather offerings for the Presbyterian Church Peace and Global Witness Offering. This offering was first gathered in 1980, and benefits groups that work at "addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world." Our congregation will keep 25% of what we gather, to be given to groups within our community that work at this. Another 25% goes to mid-councils of the church dealing with conflict and injustice. The remaining 50% goes to General Assembly, for their efforts in this country and around the world.


One small congregation heard about another small church's laundry ministry, which they called Loads of Love. They had found how hard it is on a limited budget to need to do one's laundry at a laundromat. Their 25% of their congregation's Peace and Global Witness offering began to be used by taking lots of quarters and some snacks to a laundromat close to them. They would go near the end of the month, when many limited budgets are even more limited. They got to know some of those who were there often; they found many children there with nothing to do while parents dealt with laundry. That led them to think about bringing coloring pages and crayons and markers. Eventually, they qualified for a grant from the PCUSA funds to continue to grow the program.



NEWS FROM MAKINDU

Our women's group supported Makindu Children's Program in eastern Kenya for many years, and we still get news from them. In May, devastating floods severely impacted the families supported by this Program, displacing dozens and disrupting the lives of hundreds more. The floods caused significant damage to homes in the community, creating an urgent need for shelter and recovery.

Thanks to the generous support of donors and partners, they have been able to respond quickly and effectively. They have constructed new concrete houses, providing housing for 26 individuals who were among the first affected by the floods. These sturdy homes not only offer protection from future natural disasters but also restore dignity and stability for those who lost nearly everything.

In addition to these completed homes, the program is currently overseeing major reconstruction efforts on five additional houses. These homes are scheduled to be completed within the next month, allowing 24 more people to return to a safe and secure living environment. This progress is a crucial step in rebuilding the lives of families who were displaced by the disaster.

However, the work is far from over. Twenty more homes remain on the list for repairs, pending the availability of funds and labor. The need is still great, but the impact of these newly reconstructed homes cannot be overstated. They have provided a sense of security and renewed hope for the families, empowering them to rebuild their lives in the aftermath of the disaster.

Makindu Children's Program is committed to continuing this vital work, ensuring that all affected families regain a place they can call home.
