Dear Friends.

As we enter this beautiful Christmas season, our hearts turn once again to the story that changed everything -- a story of hope born in a humble stable, of light shining in darkness, and of God doing something wonderfully new in the most unexpected way. Christmas reminds us that even when life feels heavy or complicated, renewal is possible. Scripture tells us, "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9:2), and that great light still shines for us today.

Yet many of us find it difficult to step into that light because we're still holding tightly to things from the past. Old frustrations, unresolved hurts, disappointments, or even memories of seasons that felt easier can quietly weigh us down. While holding on may feel natural, Christmas invites us to open our hands and hearts to the new things God is doing. As Paul reminds us, "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on..." (Philippians 3:13–14).

Consider Mary and Joseph. They had plans, expectations, and a sense of what their future should look like. But when the angel appeared, everything changed. They could have clung to their original path, insisting life remain predictable. Instead, with courage and faith, they embraced God's new direction. Mary's response, "May it be to me as you have said" (Luke 1:38), shows a heart willing to release the familiar and receive the miraculous. Their willingness created space for the birth of the Savior.

Then there were the shepherds. They could have stayed in the fields, tending their flocks as they always did. But when the angels proclaimed the good news, they left their routines, fears, and comfort to seek the child (Luke 2:8–16). Their openness brought them face to face with God's promise fulfilled.

We are invited into this sacred movement—from holding on too tightly to stepping forward in trust. Maybe you're clinging to an old disappointment that has shaped how you see yourself. Perhaps a long-past success or failure still influences your decisions. Or maybe you're holding a season of life so dearly that moving forward feels uncertain. But Scripture assures us, "See, I am doing a new thing... do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19). God often meets us not in what is familiar, but in what is new.

This Christmas, I encourage you to take a quiet moment to reflect: What might God be inviting you to release? And what joy, peace, or purpose could be waiting as you step forward?

May this season be one of gentle renewal—an opportunity to breathe deeply, let go graciously, and walk forward with hope. The light that entered the world on that first Christmas continues to shine, guiding us into God's new beginnings.

Wishing you peace, joy, and renewed courage in Christ.

MAKINDU

Many young siblings of the children in our program are born at home. The basic application process of acquiring a birth certificate can be daunting for the desperately poor mothers. Families receive assistance in navigating this process so that the child has an identity number and access to social services - limited as those are.

The Center offers free community seminars open to all community members on a multitude of subjects, including child advocacy and protection, women's rights (both ethically and legally within Kenya), HIV/AIDS, and more. These workshops have helped to connect many, many villagers over the years to other resource groups within Kenya to assist them.

The kids and families within the Program are given many talks and tools to help guide them to becoming more confident and self-empowered, more capable of advocacy, and more independent and self-sufficient.



WHAT IS 2026 PER CAPITA AND BASIC MISSION SUPPORT?

At the October 25, 2025, Stated Meeting of the Presbytery, ministers and commissioners voted to set the **2026 Per Capita at \$50.00 per member**, based on your church's 2024 membership.

Per Capita is the shared cost of supporting the mission and ministry of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) at every level:

Governing Body Amount per Member General Assembly \$11.26 Synod of the Pacific \$ 5.22 Presbytery of the Cascades \$33.52 Total Per Member \$50.00

Presbyterian Partnership Giving Pledge

Partnership Giving (Basic Mission Support) provides direct support for our mission congregation at Warm Springs Presbyterian Church, as well as funding Presbytery services, New Worshiping Communities, and mission support to our Synod and General Assembly not covered by per capita. Plymouth Presbyterian Church of St Helens has pledged \$1,620.00 for 2026.

WHAT DOES OUR MONEY DO?

One example: Thanks to a transformative collaboration between Living Waters for the World Haiti and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Meyer, Haiti, has received a water purification system that promises to bring health, dignity and relief to families who have struggled far too long without reliable access to clean water. The system, installed solely by Haitians, is located at a very large Catholic church. The church has more than 1,000 parishioners and also operates a school on site. Upon dedication of the system on June 1, clean water is now being provided to the school children, the church community, and the Meyer community at large.
