Dear Friends,

In the January edition of The Presbyterian Outlook Magazine (January 13, 2026), I found this article on “The Church That Gave Itself Away”. In it, I read about a small coastal congregation who choose risk over fear. As a result, they saw resurrection. Here is a summary:

In the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, Yachats Community Presbyterian Church—a small, aging congregation in a coastal Oregon town—chose not to focus on its own survival but instead gave itself away, beginning with a risky \$5,000 relief fund for displaced workers. Offering no-strings-attached cash, listening to stories, and responding to real needs, the church quickly became a lifeline for workers, families, and small businesses, eventually distributing nearly \$400,000 and helping ensure that no local business closed during the pandemic. As generosity multiplied, donations poured in, ministries expanded, and the church experienced new life—growing in attendance, mission, and hope. What began as an act of faith rippled outward, leading to ongoing community ministries, global connections, and inspiring broader generosity across the Presbytery, revealing that the church came alive not by saving itself, but by giving itself away.

Please read the full article to catch the miracle that happened there. A couple of questions jumped out at me as I read their story:

“If we’re not here for this, then why are we here at all?”

“If not now, when?”

We face a challenging year ahead (and this only February)! There will be challenges facing us as a congregation that will cause us to make a choice: risk or fear. What will we do?

We are coming to grips with “why we are here” and “if not now, when?”

My report for the Annual Report went into hiding; here is what was found:

Pastoral Associate Annual Report

I am grateful and it is an honor to be serving as Parish Associate at Plymouth – thank you all, very much!

This is a position in the Presbyterian Church that means whatever a particular congregation encourages it to mean. Since you all asked me to serve in this position, I have been privileged to edit the church newsletter and create the announcement page for the Sunday bulletin each week. (And please let me know what you would like to see in either of those that I might not have figured out . . .) I have been asked to lead worship in Pastor Peter's absence (thank you!), and have moderated a Session meeting when he was unable to be there. I get to assist in worship on communion Sundays. After participating in worship at Avamere, I (usually accompanied by a Deacon) get to take communion to Leanne Fischer, which is a joy. I get to visit with (sometimes in person, sometimes on the phone) members who cannot be with us in worship – also a joy. FINANCIAL REPORT SUMMARY

Year End, 2025

This summary describes the financial and operational status of Plymouth Church, highlighting its income, expenses, and overall fiscal health.

December Income & Expenses

As outlined in the table below, the status at year-end of the Net Operating Budget was a surplus of \$9,715. The 2025 approved budget included \$12,900 of income transferred from savings to checking. At year-end, very little of that savings income was needed. Therefore, we were able to transfer \$10,000 back to the savings account in December. This indicates good financial health for Plymouth Church. Regular income (pledges, unpledged, loose) in 2025 was 109% of the 2025 budget expectations. Regular expenses (operations, personnel, programs) in 2025 were 100% of the 2025 budget expectations.

Plymouth Investments & Savings

As of December 31, Plymouth Church had \$56,188 in checking and savings accounts combined; plus \$128,512 in our investment accounts. These continue to be strong reserves.

2025 PSS & EDUCATION SUMMARY

The deep impact of our psycho-social support and community bonding has created a resilient, safe and loving environment for the children. The Children's Center has provided consistent access to vital counseling, crisis intervention, and mental health care, helping children process complex emotions and develop coping mechanisms. Quarterly workshops bring together caregivers, community leaders, and officials to share expertise on critical topics like relationship building, behavioral skills, HIV/AIDS management, and hygiene and sanitation which fosters collective, community-wide problem-solving capacity. PSS in 2025 was crucial for many:

- *17 children received abuse and trauma counseling
- *515 children benefitted from visits from MCC social workers & CHVs
- *19 children received recorded birth certificates
- *363 children attended quarterly PSS sessions which include age-appropriate behavior and communication workshops, check-ins with MCC staff, and a big community meal.

In EDUCATION news, the past year has again been one of academic success and opportunity for the children in our program. We are proud of the achievements in our education program, which continues to be the most powerful tool for breaking the cycle of poverty.

We have ensured that 542 children in our care have uninterrupted access to education, from primary school through secondary school. MCP's support removes all financial barriers—covering tuition, uniforms, textbooks, and supplies—allowing every child to pursue their studies with dedication and enthusiasm. This stable academic environment helps them focus entirely on learning and growing.

Education is more than just grades; it's building self-confidence, leadership skills, and a hopeful vision for their futures.
